Ehrman Crest is the result of a successful building project that united the District and the Children's Museum of Pittsburgh in a planned effort to advance bold new opportunities for school design. Ehrman Crest models exciting new ideas around how corridors and walls are used; how the building and surrounding natural environment can be teaching tools; how adaptability allows for constant curation of physical learning spaces; and how space can take students on learning journeys.

From the moment this innovative, state-of-the-art K-6 facility opened its doors, it has received numerous awards including being named a 2022 "Best Invention" by TIME.

School administrators throughout western Pennsylvania and educational leaders from across the globe have toured Ehrman Crest, seeing first-hand how the building serves as a model facility for other K-12 schools across the country and even the world.

Reflecting on Community

'WE ARE SV'



A new initiative, "We are SV," was introduced at Seneca Valley Senior and Intermediate High Schools. "We are SV," encompasses a set of shared expectations that make the school atmosphere a more supportive and productive environment for everyone. School administrators, teachers and guidance counselors met with students in the Learn, Explore, Act, Develop (LEAD) group to determine the best ways for promoting a positive school culture which resulted in an identified way of belonging and holding oneself accountable as a member of the larger SV community.

CHANGING THE WORLD



Haine Elementary kindergarten students in Ms. Ciara Was' classroom celebrated diversity by participating in a variety of activities in anticipation of Martin Luther King Jr. Day. Discussions about Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. were followed by the reading of "The Color of Us" by Karen Katz and a unique art project. Students chose their own skin tone color paint to create their handprint. The handprints were then cut out to make a huge heart bulletin board showing how all the beautiful, diverse skin colors make a piece of their classroom family. Ms. Was shared that the diversity lesson improves the classroom environment and understanding of humanity while building acceptance of people regardless of their appearance.

HISTORICAL SHOWCASE



Sixth grade students from Haine Middle School showcased their projects during an Anne Frank Gallery Walk, which featured thematic and collaborative efforts from their studies of Anne Frank. This event offered an in-depth look of Anne Frank through the facets of the students' 21st century learning skills. Another component featured a community service project where students, in conjunction with Jewish Family and Community Services, collected much needed personal items to help replenish supplies.

Additionally, students organized a "Butterflies of Hope" collection to send positive messages to refugees and families being supported through donations.



COMMUNITY GROWN



Ryan Gloyer Middle School (RGMS) students wrapped up their year by giving back to the community as part of the first-ever "Community Grown" service project initiative that serves to strengthen connections with each of the nine communities within the Seneca Valley School District. Seventh and eighth grade students volunteered at various townships and municipalities. Some of the service projects included planting trees and shrubs, mulching, washing police cars, installing benches, weeding, building signs and more. The students enjoyed beautiful weather and the opportunity to give back to communities that have given so much for their education.

The Girls Soccer Booster Group organized a Leukemia & Lymphoma Awareness night for the game versus North Hills. A night full of fundraisers, awareness and education led to a donation of \$17,000 to the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society in Ginny's name. The sea of purple humanity was on full display that evening and the amount of community pride was inexpressible.



Additionally, students at Connoquenessing Valley Elementary School (CVE) participated in a fundraising effort in honor of their classmate, fourth grader Chase Collins. Staff and students combined their efforts to raise over \$7,700 for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society. From hosting a coin drive and bracelet sale to selling raffle baskets, CVE students, staff and parents came together in a sincere way to show their support for Chase.

SPECIAL EDUCATION



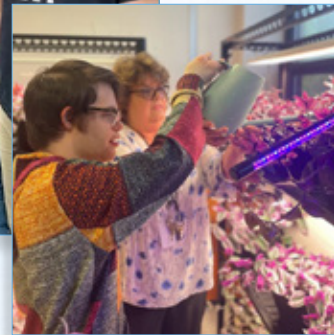
The Seneca Valley School District's Special Education Department is committed to meeting the needs of students with disabilities and helping them reach their potential. The Seneca Valley School District offers a continuum of services and placement options to meet the needs of each student. Services include but are not limited to:

- Autistic Support
- Blind-Visually Impaired Support
- Deaf and Hard of Hearing Support
- Emotional Support
- Learning Support
- Life Skills Support
- Multiple Disabilities Support
- Speech and Language Support

In addition, services for eligible students may also be provided by Midwestern Intermediate Unit IV (MIU-IV). Services provided by MIU-IV may be provided in the district by itinerant MIU-IV staff or in multi-district programs.

GIFTED EDUCATION

If a student demonstrates a potential need for gifted services, a multidisciplinary evaluation is conducted to determine if the child is in need of special programming. The evaluation process may be initiated by school staff or by a child's parent, who may do so by contacting the building principal.

The amount and type of gifted support to be received by a student is determined on an individual basis annually by the child's Gifted Individualized Education Program (GIEP) team, of which the parent is a very important member.

SVAOC DROP-IN CENTER



Seneca Valley Academy of Choice (SVAOC) has been providing full-time and hybrid cyber opportunities for students for over 15 years. This program has grown and expanded to now provide various forms of online education to nearly 1,400 Seneca Valley students in grades K-12. Overall, the SVAOC allows for continued growth, customization, flexible scheduling and opportunities to champion initiatives to help transform the future of education.

In May 2023, SVAOC cut the ribbon on a new Cyber Drop-in Center, which signals an exciting next step in cyber education.

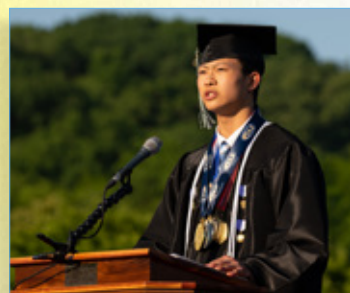


It's in the heart of our community and easily accessible for students. Our well-established SVAOC cyber staff offers on-site, personalized learning opportunities in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM), tutoring, intervention, enrichment activities, physical education classes and other programs.

This new facility complements the K-12 cyber program by providing a physical space for students to access resources, receive support and engage in a collaborative and social learning environment. It enhances the overall educational experience and helps ensure that all students, regardless of their circumstances, have equal opportunities to succeed in the cyber program and at Seneca Valley.

NATIONAL WINNERS



The National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC®) announced that **Haihan Xu (SV '23, co-valedictorian)** was a National Merit \$2,500 Scholarship winner. Mr. Xu, one of 2,500 Merit Scholar designees, was chosen from a talent pool of more than 15,000 outstanding Finalists in the 2023 National Merit Scholarship Program.

Peter Ko (SV '23, co-valedictorian) and **Eric Combs (SV '23)** were named semifinalists and then finalists in the 68th Annual National Merit Scholarship Program held by the NMSC. Additionally, **Ava Stewart (SV '23)** was named a Commended Student in the 2023 National Merit Scholarship Program.

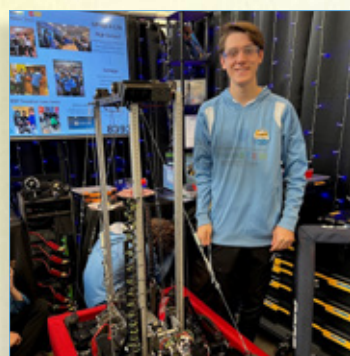
MAKING HISTORY



Seneca Valley's High School Mock Trial team made school history with their advancement to the State Championship, which took place March 24-25, 2023, in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, at the Dauphin County Court House. There were only 14 teams out of 312 from across the state who qualified, including Seneca Valley, ultimately earning them an eighth-place finish in the championship.

This extraordinary accomplishment marked the first time in which the SV Mock Trial team advanced from regionals to district finals then to the State Championship.

FIRST SUCCESS



Lucas Boyle (SV '24) was selected as a FIRST Dean's List award winner during the FIRST Championship, a worldwide robotics competition that was held April 19-22, 2023, in Houston, Texas. With over 130,000 applicants from around the world, Mr. Boyle was one of 10 FIRST Tech Challenge (FTC) winners.

Throughout the competition, Mr. Boyle represented his western Pennsylvania based robotics team, The Giant Diencephalic BrainSTEM Robotics Team. Students who earn FIRST Dean's List Award status are great examples of student leaders who have led their teams and communities to increased awareness for FIRST and its mission and have also achieved personal engineering and technical expertise and accomplishment.
